From the Pastor

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday, February 22 and culminates on Easter Sunday, April 8. There are many traditions that are

practiced in mainline denominations. A general statement that may fit for all is that it is a time of simplicity and preparation.

Lent can be a time of personal growth in our own "life-time journey of faith and spiritual growth". One can be as focused and structured on one's faith as desired.

There are themes that we observe during this 40-day period.

- Penitence - the quality or state of being penitent sorrow for sins or faults.
- Baptismal renewal - Our Lenten Confessions should prepare us to reject Satan, all his works, and all his empty promises and to make a deep act of faith in the Father, Son, and Spirit.
- Prayer, fasting, and service - Prayer and fasting is defined as voluntarily going without food in order to focus on prayer and fellowship with God. Having a dedicated time of prayer and fasting is not a way of manipulating God into doing what you desire. Rather, it is simply forcing yourself to focus and rely on God for the strength, provision, and wisdom you need.
- Confession of sin - This is rooted in the promise of God that comes through the cross of Christ.

Now, after sharing these words of information on the meaning and theme of Lent, I want to share some words that I found in a Lenten booklet that I found recently, *Book of Faith - Lenten Journey - Marks of the Christian*, by **David L. Miller**.

The following is an excerpt from the Ash Wednesday devotional:

"Your love burned for me and in me, Holy Mystery. And I yearned for more, to touch the flame of the love whose source is beyond human imagining.

Through the restless burning of my soul, you moved me beyond my fears to throw myself into the arms of the hope you ignited in me. Loving Mystery, you were - and are - that hope that burns in us, moving us to reach beyond the fears that hold us back from more deeply knowing and serving you."

Theological Thoughts

"Each person meets God in his or her own experience, whether that experience occurs with a community at a liturgical or paraliturgical service, or with one or two others, or alone."

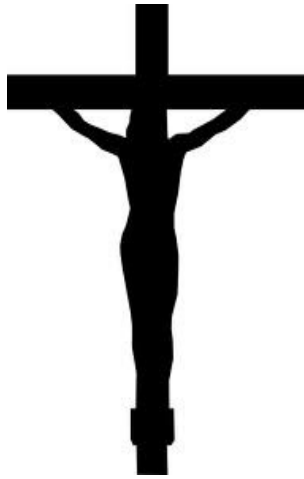
Questions to Ponder

Urban Servant Corps Celebrates 25 Years!

Urban Servant Corps was founded in 1987 to provide full-time volunteer support and to encourage an opportunity for personal, spiritual, communal and professional growth of the participating individuals. Each day, 18 Urban Servant Corps volunteers accomplish 144 hours of volunteer work that provide food to hungry people, job counseling to the unemployed, a safe shelter from inclement weather, childcare for children who are developmentally delayed, education and training on how to eat healthy and low-cost meals and any number of other basic-need services.

Some of their agency partners include: No Kid Hungry-Cooking Matters, Harm Reduction Action Center, St. Paul's Lutheran Assistance, Energy Outreach Colorado, The Gathering Place, Sewall Child Development Center, St. Francis Center, Urban Peak, Metro CareRing, Colorado Coalition for the Homeless, Hope Communities and Empowerment Program.

As they celebrate their 25th anniversary, they ask you to take action! They are giving you an opportunity to invest in Urban Servant Corps volunteers. Here's how:

It pays for food; it pays for shelter and gives the man the self-esteem to be a healthy and productive member of society. At Step 13, they are proud to be 52% sufficient without taking Federal, State or City funding. Step 13 is location in downtown Denver at 2029 Larimer St.

So, as you are cleaning out your house, think about donating any of the following items to help their program: Usable men's clothing and shoes, reading materials, small appliances, travel equipment and any other usable items that men can use.

Why pancakes?

Pancakes are associated with the day preceding Lent because they were a way to use up rich foodstuffs such as eggs, milk, and sugar, before the fasting season of the 40 days of Lent. The liturgical fasting emphasized eating plainer food and refraining from food that would give pleasure. In many cultures, this means no meat, dairy, or eggs.

Usually pancakes are on Shrove Tuesday, the day before Ash Wednesday, also known as Pancake Day in England. On Pancake Day, pancake races are held in villages and towns across the United Kingdom. The tradition is said to have originated when a housewife from Olney was so busy making pancakes that she forgot the time until she heard the church bells ringing for the service. She raced out of the house to church while still carrying her frying pan and pancake. The pancake race remains a relatively common festive tradition in the UK, and England in particular, even today. Participants with frying pans race through the streets tossing pancakes into the air, catching them in the pan whilst running. The contestants, traditionally women, carry a frying pan and race to the finishing line while tossing the pancakes as they go. The winner is the first to cross the line having tossed the pancake a certain number of times. Traditionally, when men want to participate, they must dress up as a housewife (usually an apron and a bandanna).

Come join the fun on Sunday February 19th, at 10:30 a.m., eat some pancakes and maybe, just maybe, there will be a pancake race.

The collection basket is above the coat rack outside of Fellowship Hall. The coupon clippers service a company who gives Community Ministry 5% of the value of the coupon. This is a free and easy way we can all help.

Community Ministry has a children's area where the kids can play, read a book or watch a movie while their parents are doing paperwork or choosing their food. They let each child take home a book from this area and are now running low on books. If you have extra children's books, consider donating them to Community Ministry.

Also as you travel, collect any toiletries from hotels. They can use toothbrushes, toothpaste, bar soap, shampoo and toilet paper to help them make up small hygiene kits. Community Ministry is pleased to announce that Colorado Gives Day was a huge success. They received donations of \$6,390 (not including matching funds). This is almost three times the amount they received in 2010.

Will you help? Malaria prevention efforts include emphases on:

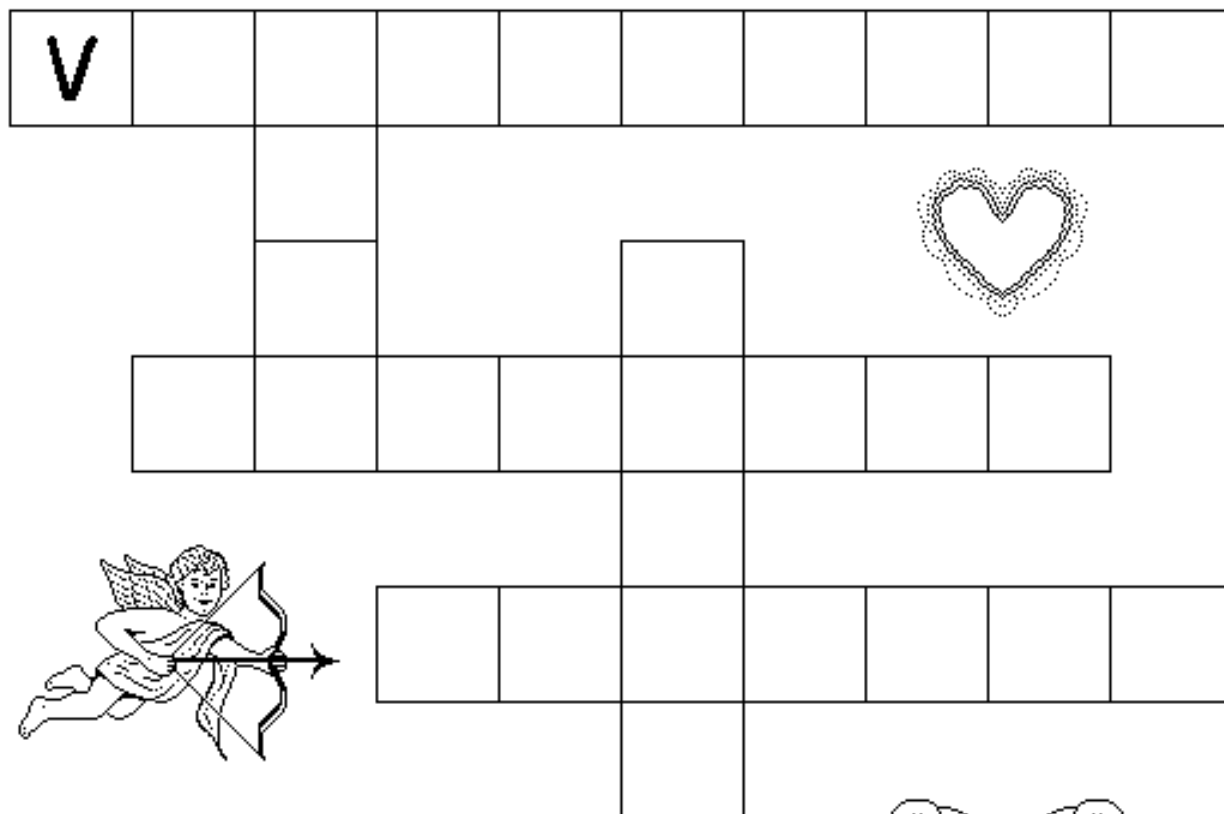
- health care

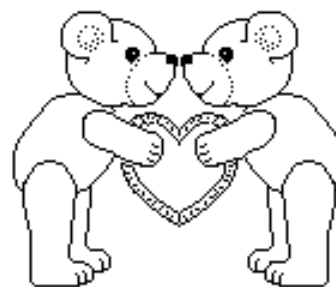
