From the Pastor

Greetings to you all in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

It is with great joy that I am able to

be here at Christ the King as your Interim Pastor. I want to take this opportunity to tell you a little about me.

Growing up on a small farm in Minnesota was a wonderful experience. We were close to much of our extended family and Sunday family gatherings were a regular occurrence. Family has always been and still is an important part of life.

I was married to the most wonderful woman for 40 years. We met our first week of college, so knew each other five years before we were married. She died of cancer in 2004. I have three children and five grandsons. Two of my children are here in the Denver area and the other one is in the Cleveland, Ohio area. I have 5 grandsons, ranging in age from 6 to 17.

I have been in the Denver area since 1979. I guess that makes it 32 years!

I came here as a Chaplain at Lutheran Medical Center in Wheat Ridge. The last 16 years I was the Chaplain and Grief Coordinator for the Hospice Program. During that time, I also served for 12 years as the Grief Coordinator for the state of Colorado National Hospice Organization.

I am currently also a Pastoral Counselor with Pastoral Counseling for Denver. I have been with them for about the past ten years. I served as the Pastor for Pastoral Care at Abiding Hope Lutheran Church, Littleton, for 6 years.

Previous positions were as a Minister for Music, Youth and Education, in Minnesota and Michigan. I taught middle school English in a Lutheran school in LaGrange, Illinois. Serving as an Interim Pastor at Lutheran Church of the Cross, Evergreen, Colorado was a wonderful experience.

Doing workshops on grief and loss, death and dying have been a result of my work in the hospital and hospice settings. A previous co-worker often kidded me about my status as a "Certified Death Educator".

I do not want this time with you to be just a "waiting for the new Pastor" time, but a time to be active in the ministry of Christ the King Lutheran Church. I will be happy to meet with you and hear what your needs are and what your vision is of the future here.

I will be happy to meet with you most any time during work hours (usually 9:00 am – 4:30 pm). It would be helpful to make an appointment, but just stopping in is acceptable - if you catch me here. Did You Know?

- Amy & Mary Ann Evancheck recently traveled to southern Norway on an Augustana College alumni tour. Augustana is celebrating its 150th anniversary this year.
- On June 13, the Duckett Fire in southern Colorado forced the evacuation of Rainbow Trail Lutheran Camp. About 180 junior-high aged campers and camp employees were evacuated to the Custer County High School in Westcliffe. For now, the entire camp has moved to Horn Creek Camp near Rainbow Trail. Director, Dave Jarvis, said that the fire burned right up to the edge of camp, burning some hay bales on the archery range and some ground near the ropes course. The only damage to the camp buildings is the smell of smoke. After an "all clear" and a cleanup, they hope to have the campers back at Rainbow Trail soon.
- The 40,000 square foot floor, designed by Scott Parsons and installed at the University of Alberta, Canada, recently received the 2011 "Project of the Year" award by the Terrazzo, Tile and Marble Association of Canada.

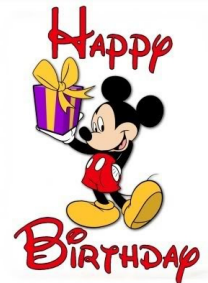
Pastoral Call Process

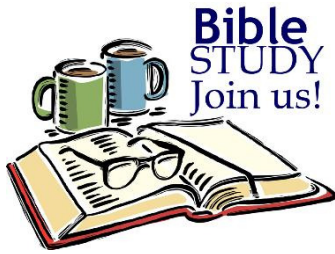

A Letter from the Bishop

June 2, 2011

We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed but not driven to despair; persecuted but not forsaken; struck down but not destroyed (2 Corinthians 4:8-9).

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Our hearts have been breaking for weeks as we have watched incessant storms devastate many parts of the United States. From the plains of North Dakota to the bayous of Louisiana, floodwaters and torrential rain have washed out communities and cropland. Destructive tornado strikes leveled homes for miles in cities and towns including Joplin, Mo., and Cullman, Ala. Two ELCA church buildings -- one in each state -- were destroyed.

The winds destroyed the building of Peace Lutheran Church in Joplin, but not the faith of its members. Last Sunday they gathered in the parking lot in the midst of debris and shattered hopes to worship in the strong name of the risen Christ.

In the aftermath of storms that seem relentless, we may feel overwhelmed and anxious, but not powerless. For God's promise is clear: nothing in all creation will separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus. Trusting in God's promise and the power of the Holy Spirit, we respond by joining together in God's work of restoring community. The liberating power of the gospel frees us to repair roofs in Cullman and fill sandbags in Fargo, on behalf of people we don't know and may never meet.

These are our commitments as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America:

- **We will pray.** Pray with me that those affected may have the strength and courage they need to face these difficult days.
- **We will stand together,** roll up our sleeves and work with partners to

rebuild lives and restore hope. In Alabama, we are already at work with the Mennonites and the Christian Reformed Church in a rapid rebuilding project. Elsewhere, partnerships are unfolding with the United Methodist Church and others to coordinate volunteers to repair and rebuild homes and lives in the months and years to come. Working together we can achieve more on a scale and scope than we could ever achieve alone.

- **We will give generously.** We are already organizing volunteer opportunities in response to the unmet needs of these communities. To support our efforts, please give now to [ELCA Disaster Response](#). Your gift designated to Severe Spring Storms will be used in full -- 100 percent -- for the people and communities deeply affected by these storms.
- **We will stay until the work is done.** One of our strengths as Lutherans is our practice of sustained response after a natural disaster, built on local networks of congregations and social ministries. Central States Synod Bishop Gerald Mansholt compared our work to long-distance running. [ELCA Disaster Response](#) was one of the first to arrive in Missouri and Alabama, and they will be the last to leave. Even as we begin this journey, our work continues on the Gulf Coast and in Haiti.
- **We will witness to our living faith** in Christ Jesus as we join together to do God's work with our hands.

In all these things, I give thanks for each of you. May we be about God's healing and restoration in a time of despair. May we bring God's message of hope in the wake of spring storms.

A History of the CTK Courtyard...Chapter I

Beginning construction

1985: I have to admit that for many a Sunday I would gaze out at the barren space between the Fellowship Hall and the main sanctuary of our church and dream of what a perfect spot for a Courtyard Garden it could be. Over and over I was told it was not possible; there was no money for such things, etc. etc. Not being one to take "No" for an answer easily, and finding a kindred spirit in Hal Peterson who had the same dream, I raised seed money of \$3000. I then went to the Church Council with a plan. After much hue and cry, the council gave approval as part of a long-range master plan for improvement of church facilities. No indebtedness was to be incurred or general budget funds used. Our first committee was Pat Sandstedt, Hal Peterson, Bob and Verna Wolf, Norma Ingwers, Barbara Masoner and Byron Kaven. Thanks to Hal Peterson who knew a landscape designer (Jocelyn Chilvers) who we asked to design a plan for the courtyard. We discovered that metal bars hanging outside of the sanctuary windows were installed with the idea of flower boxes being installed outside the windows in the original plans of the church, as well as a door from the Fellowship Hall for the future of a courtyard!

1988: Our money-raising efforts met with great success, and we were ready to start Phase I of the courtyard in the spring of 1989. This consisted of grading, sod and drainage, a slab including sleaving, tint and pattern and electrical work. Landscaping was a separate entity. We inserted one sheet in the Herald with a breakdown of all plant materials and their cost, i.e. Rosebush \$13, Forget-me-nots \$40, Red Valerian \$6. Individuals signed up for what they wanted planted in memory of whom. When the landscaping was done, I will never forget Emil Schmidt gazing out the window and asking me which tree they had given. With a straight face I said, "The dead one!" He was quiet for a moment and then broke into a hearty laugh. The first concolor fir tree had died, but was replaced at no charge later!

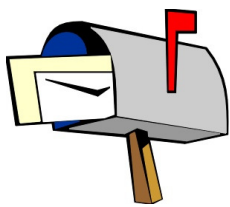
CTK Camping and Rafting Trip

- Need 2 large water jugs or pick up one at McDonalds.

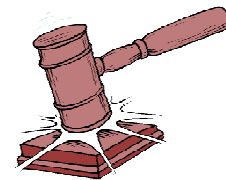
- Housing for two camp staff Sunday night - Friday morning.
